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ELA Core Plans

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Autobiography in Five Short Chapters Lesson Plan

- 1. Tell or show students the title of the poem only the title. Have them write two questions inspired by the title. To generate interest, allow willing students to share their questions.
- 2. Distribute the poem. Tell students to take notes in the margins about what they notice and what they wonder. Tell them to pay attention to repetition. Allow them to highlight, write questions, and annotate as much as they can. Ask them to look for the deeper meaning. Give them about six or seven minutes to annotate.
- 3. Watch the poem on you tube. All students like to watch a video! ©
- 4. Give out the handout with the questions to make sure students have a basic understanding of the poem. Before doing this, you could have students illustrate each "chapter" of the poem.
- 5. Discuss the questions.
- 6. Give out the *Think About It* handout or simply use it as a discussion guide. Brainstorm together with the students.
- 7. Now, students will make the theme of this poem personal by thinking about a "hole" in their own lives. Give out the handout with the pictures, and have students complete their own.
- 8. Allow willing students to share.
- 9. Finally, lead a discussion about how being mean and disrespectful to others can lead to "holes" this year in class. Allow students to complete their own "street signs" for the classroom using the handout. If you prefer, you could allow students to work with a partner or do them together as a class.

Think about it...

This poem has a metaphor. The streets and the hole are metaphors. What exactly do they stand for? Interpretations can vary, but it seems that the hole is some problem that the speaker continuously faces, and the street is the gateway to that problem.

For example, perhaps the "street" could represent hanging out with a certain group of people. Each time the speaker hangs out with this group, he/she finds himself/herself in trouble.

Street = certain group of people Hole = trouble

After multiple times of getting in trouble, the speaker still hangs out with these people. Until finally, he/she realizes that it is the group of people who are leading to the trouble, so the speaker finds a different group of people with whom to associate.

Street = certain group of people
Hole = trouble
Another street= new group of people

In the box below, brainstorm different "holes" that people can face. Beside each one, see if you can name a "street" – something that helps lead to the "hole". One example has been done for you.
