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Vocabulary Memory Cards

Each card contains the following:

- a word
- the definition of the word
- a "Think of" mnemonic device (The think of will either rhyme or look like/sound like the word.)
- an "imagine story or line" to help students link the mnemonic to the definition of the word.
- a picture

*There are blank cards included at the end so that students can make their own vocabulary cards in the same way using new words that they are learning.

Vocabulary Memory Cards

Set up the center

In our classrooms, we use three ring binders to "house" our centers. We keep supplies inside using page protectors and plastic folders that have holes in them.

Print the vocabulary cards on card stock. Cut each one out.

Print blank cards as well, and cut those out.

Place them in a folder, three-ring binder, or basket. We recommend a three-ring binder.

Print the list of vocabulary words or make your own. Add this to the center.


Print the sample worksheet and place it in the center.

Copy several of the worksheets for the center.

You will also need dictionaries and colored pencils or art supplies at this center.

Print the directions on the next page and place in a page protector or inside the cover of a binder. If you are using folders, you can tape these directions on the outside of the folder.

You may wish to display students' vocabulary memory cards in the classroom, or add them to the ones in this center.



Everything fits nicely in a binder!


Place directions in a page protector in front.

Place the sample worksheet in the front so students can look at it to know what to do.

Place the list of words in a page protector.


Even colored pencils can be placed in a folder inside notebook!




complete the vocabulary sheet. Then, each person should create

If using folders for your centers, place vocabulary cards, lots of blank cards, and the list of words inside. These can be printed on cardstock for durability.





Directions 1. Choose one vocabulary card and read it. For the first assignment, make sure you choose a card and not a word from the list. Each card has a word, the definition of the word, a "think of" to help you remember the word, and an "imagine statement" that helps you remember the word. Read the definition, "think of" and "imagine" statement to help you remember the word on the card that you have chosen. Notice that the "think of" will either sound like or look like the word itself. 2. Complete the worksheet to explain your understanding of the word. You can look at the sample sheet included to help you know what to do. 3. Next, choose your own word from the vocabulary list and make a vocabulary memory card for it using one of the blank cards. You will need to look up the definition. Then, you will need to think of a way to help remember the word. Create a "Think of" and an "Imagine Statement" just like on the completed card that you chose. 4. If there is more than one person using this center, work together to complete the vocabulary sheet. However, each person should complete a sheet. Then, each person should create his/her own card using a different word. 5. Use one of the completed cards as a guide when making your own vocabulary memory card.

Frequently Asked Questions About Directions

Q. If I am working with a partner, can use the same vocabulary card to do the worksheet?

A. Yes, however, you must both have your own worksheet. You can not just write one. You will need two, one copy for each of you.

Q. If I am working with a partner, can we complete one vocabulary card for both of us?

A. No, you should each choose your own word and create your own card.

Q. What is a part of speech?

A. There are eight parts of speech: nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, pronouns, prepositions, conjunctions, and interjections. If you cannot figure out the part of speech of the word, look up the word in the dictionary. Parts of speech are written right beside the word in the dictionary.

Q. What do I write for "What it is" and "What it's not" on the work sheet?

A. For "What it is" you can write the definition. For "What it's not" you can write an antonym.

Q. What do I write for "Example" and "Nonexample"?

A. Let's say the word is beautiful. An example could be "a really pretty princess". A nonexample could be "an ugly green troll."

Q. How do I define the word that I will do for my card?

A. Look up the word in a dictionary.

Q. How do I come up with a "Think of"?

A. Look at the word. Say the word out loud. Does it look like another word or sound like something else? If so, then that can be your "Think of". Next, try to come up with a short story to link your "think of" to the meaning of the vocabulary word. This will be your "imagine". Look at the sample cards that are already complete to help you.

Q. What do I do if I finish early?


A. Color your vocabulary card. Make it look as good as the cards that are already complete. If you finish this, complete the early finisher work assigned by your teacher.

Winsome Charming


Think of <u>Prince Winsome</u> **Imagine** Prince Winsome

Think of more Flies



Think of abs gone



Think of <u>a product called</u> "Pennish"


Imagine a blemish eraser in the shape of a pen. Simply touch the "pennish" to any blemish, and it immediately disappears!





Think of the bush


Imagine a little boy **hiding** in a **bush**. He is going to **ambush** his friends when they run by.




Wayward reckless; disobedient






Dormant not active; sleeping

Think of <u>"Out with it"</u>






IngeniousClever or skillful

Imagine man who opens up his home to convicts. He allows them to sit in his den, watch T.V., and share their stories. Most people would **condemn** having cons in their den.




Detest to dislike very much

Think of live like Ed

Imagine a man named Ed who lives on the bottom floor of a two-story apartment. The people above him are always stomping, hollering, and making lots of noise. Ed gets very *mad* because he can hardly sleep. If you *lived* like *Ed*, you would be *livid* every day!

Think of error

Imagine the letter *n* being replaced with the letter *r* in the word. Then, the first five letters of the word would spell *error*, which is the meaning of this word!







Think of can't take us

someone is **rejected**, he/she often






Timid Shy





Bamboozle to deceive by trickery

Think of Bam's booze








Think of <u>a stink bomb</u> (if you say the word abominable in slow motion, it sounds like "a bomb in a bowl".)
